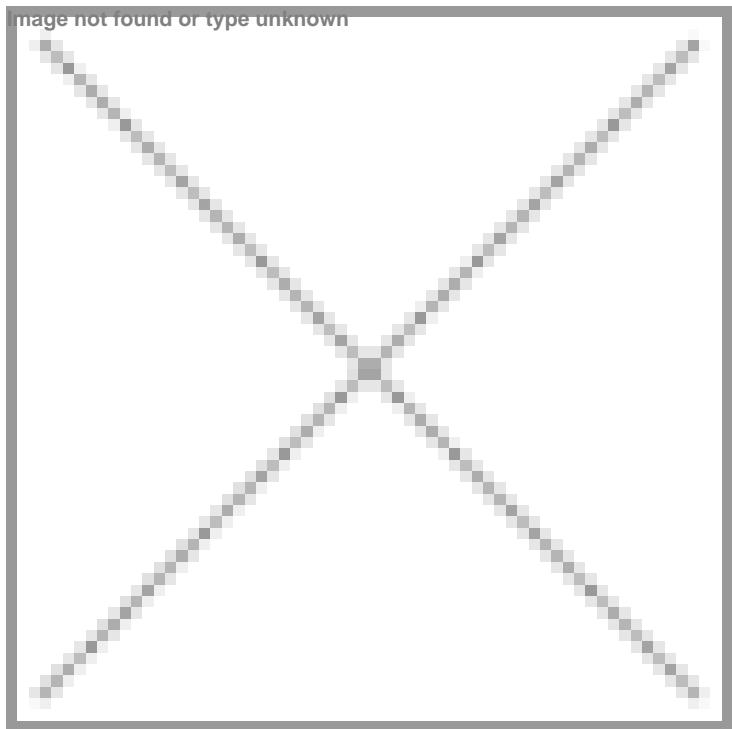


Meghalaya government and Apollo Telemedicine unite forces to organise Cancer Conclave 2024
